Well, for me, as a Crestonian for 30 years, it's definitely AirB&B. I came here in 1994 for a conference on sacred geometry and sacred art with Keith Critchlow, who designed the Lindisfarne Chapel, which is now the Zen Center dome in the sacred divine proportions. I've seen a lot of changes in the housing situation over the last 3 decades.

As a professional residential real estate broker for 40 years, we are zoned residential, and the AirB&B's are commercial. You're turning your residential neighborhood into commercial, which is hotel. And so, we have all the people coming in who aren't community based. They're coming in with their light pollution, their designer dogs and their trash. The littering in Crestone is crazy right now. And the visitors are driving way over the speed limit. So, it's illegal because you're changing the zoning.

Saguache county and the POA have to get on this. They say they want to limit it, but it's not about limiting it - it's about staying legal and true to the zoning. We're zoned residential, not commercial. It's one thing if you had a room or a casita, but now people are buying houses and using AirB&B money to make their mortgage payment. It's not cohesive or neighborly or community based.

The other challenge with AirB&B is it's not respecting community housing for local residents. Everyone's gotten into this greed and money and me-me-me thing instead of housing and supporting a community-based neighborhood. Who wants to live next to a hotel? It used to be so quiet here you could actually hear the stars!!!
